Robert A. Heverly is an Assistant Professor of Law at Albany Law School of Union University, in Albany, New York, where he teaches courses in intellectual property and information technology law, as well as Tort law. Prior to joining the faculty at Albany Law, Prof. Heverly was a Visiting Professor of Law at Michigan State University's College of Law, in East Lansing, Michigan, and before that, from 2003-2008, he was a Lecturer in Law and Director of the LL.M. Programme in Information, Technology and Intellectual Property Law at the University of East Anglia's Norwich Law School. Before joining the academy as a faculty member, Prof. Heverly was the Assistant Director of the Government Law Center of Albany Law School, and at various times worked at private law firms, the NYS legislature, and in various other industries. Prof. Heverly's primary areas of research revolve around property, technology, information, and intellectual property.
